4. Have you ever wondered how to prepare a thank you of tobacco?

If you do not have access to traditional ceremonial tobacco, contact a 7 Eleven near you and ask if they have Drum tobacco. A pouch costs between \$35 and \$40. Cut squares (3 to 4 inches square) from plain red cloth, place a good-sized pinch of tobacco (about the size of a large strawberry) in the middle, pull the edges together into a bundle/pouch and tie it with twine.
