# 2. Highlighting Indigenous-led initiatives and organizations: Wisahkotewinowak

In an effort to familiarize ourselves with local Indigenous-led organizations we're writing about one each month. If you'd like to tell us about one, please forward info along. Thanks.

Wisahkotewinowak is a Métis word meaning the first green shoots that come up from Mother Earth after a fire has gone through the land. Wisahkotewinowak is also an urban Indigenous and settler-ally gardening collective that supports community development and Indigenous food sovereignty in Waterloo Region and Wellington County. Their four locations provide food for the local community. Not only do they grow food, but they also cook, and preserve the food from these sites.

They are always looking for volunteers in their gardens and kitchens. This spring they will be tapping maple trees to boil maple syrup. Whether it's growing and harvesting, or cooking and preserving, they appreciate helping hands.
